John Jewell tells about a young woman named Virginia, 19 years old and pregnant when she went to live with her 15th set of foster parents. "Her case file read like a textbook example of neglect, abuse, and bureaucratic failure. She sat silently in a chair, hands neatly clasped, staring into her lap. The foster parents, whose three children were in school, had been apprised of Virginia's story and promised that this placement would be 'temporary.' (Temporary was the story of Virginia's life.)

"Finally, the foster mother said, 'Are you frightened, Virginia?'

"Kinda,' she replied without looking up. "I've been in lots of homes."

"Well,' the sympathetic woman tried to reassure the bewildered young mother-to-be, 'Let's hope this time turns out for the best.'

"Virginia's reply is one of those statements that sticks to your soul," says John Jewell. "It was flat, without change of tone and without Virginia even looking up. 'Hurts too much to hope."

Like the word Love, Hope is one of those words we often use quite casually.

"I hope it will be a nice day."

"I hope the bus will be on time."

"I hope mom won't have spinach for dinner tonight."

There is nothing wrong with this. The word fits nicely into a variety of contexts. But when we speak about hope in the biblical and life events context, we are using a word packed with power and meaning. Hope is a two-edged sword. Hope can give a person the courage and endurance to fight against seemingly insurmountable odds. A person with hope can withstand the coldest and darkest nights and the hottest days.

Yet unfulfilled hope can break the spirit and leave a person desolate and empty. This is the place the young woman in our story seems to be. With sadness, we think back to the day a little girl who found joy in living and had hopes and dreams for the future. Someone stole those hopes and dreams from Virginia. She was told she was worthless. She learned that her only purpose was to be used by others and tossed away like a dirty towel.

Surely one of the greatest of evils is the abuse and neglect of a child which snuffs out that inner light that gives hope. Jesus said such people should have a millstone hung around their neck and be tossed into the sea. I couldn't agree more.

During this season of hope and joy, let us remember the Virginias of this world for whom the holidays only bring more pain and loneliness. The real message of hope is that Virginia is loved by a God who never forgets that she is suffering and will never let her go no matter how deep she falls into the darkness of despair.

Every one just wants to be loved. Needs to be loved.

Find someone this season, every season, who needs to know that they are loved. So much suffering in this world could be abated if the lost, lonely, and hurting could only experience sincere and enduring love. Hope will be rekindled, and waning spirits will find new life. What greater and more precious gift can we give anytime of the of the year? From our loving Father we receive our hope. Let's share it.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

- 1. Worship and Music- Still waiting on organ proposal update. Music Sunday was a great service. Want more of the older hymns incorporated into the service at times. November 5th is All Saints Sunday and First Communion, November 19th will be a Healing service, November 22nd is Thanksgiving Eve service, November 26th is Christ the King Sunday w/ Holy Communion. Bulletin price has increased so the new bulletin sponsor Price will be increased to \$18.00 for all & \$9.00 for half.
- 2. Parish Education- Jean says attendance is better for her class. Susan suggested trying to get another teacher so we could split up the class so there is not such a large age difference between them. Currently the class is Nursery thru 6th grade. Anyone who would like to teach please let the office know or let a council member know. Going to put in next newsletter and Sunday bulletins asking for anyone who would be willing to help teach.
- 3. <u>Stewardship & Evangelism</u> Talking about having a float in the holiday parade thru town on November 25th at 12, noon. If you would like to help with this please talk to Tracy Bixler or Jean Perkins.

Chefs Corner

Do to this recipe missing some ingredients last month. Here is the corrected recipe.

Pumpkin Dessert

1(16oz.) can pumpkin ½ tsp. cinnamon 1 cup sugar 1 tsp. vanilla 1 can sweetened condensed milk 4 beaten eggs

Topping

1 box carrot cake mix 1 cup chopped pecans

13/4 sticks butter (melted)

Preheat oven to 350*. Mix together pumpkin, sugar, eggs, cinnamon, and milk. Pour into a 9x13 inch greased pan. Sprinkle dry cake mix over pumpkin mix, then drizzle butter over dry mix. Bake at 350* for 45 minutes. Sprinkle chopped pecans over top and press lightly into cake. Bake for 15 minutes more. Serve with whipped cream.

Christmas Shortbread Drops

1 cup butter 2 cup flour ½ cup sugar 1 cup raisins

1 egg yolk 1 cup chopped walnuts

½ tsp. salt 2 tsp. vanilla

Cream butter and sugar well. Blend in egg yolk, vanilla, flour, and salt. Mix well. Stir in raisins and walnuts. Drop by teaspoon on to greased cookie sheets and bake at 350* for 12-15 minutes or till delicately browned.

Easy Chicken Pie

2 cups diced potatoes
1 lb. pkg. mixed veggies
1½ cups chicken broth
Cornstarch to thicken
2 cups diced chicken

½ loaf of frozen bread dough or 6 dough balls

Thaw dough and cut into bite size pieces. Cook potatoes and veggies till soft and then drain well. Heat broth and cream till hot and thicken with cornstarch to make a thick gravy. Pour gravy over potatoes and veggies then add chicken and mix carefully not to over mix, that it becomes mushy. Pour into a 9x13 inch baking dish. Place dough pieces on top and bake at 350* for about 30 minutes or till dough is golden brown.

Cheese Spread

1 block cream cheese 1½ cup shredded coppers Cheese

2 oz. pimento's chopped \quad \quad \quad \text{cup pickled relish}

½ cup mayonnaise

Mix all ingredients together and let chill for 24 hours. Serve with crackers.

At nearly six feet six, weighing three hundred pounds, Phillips Brooks cast a long shadow. He was a native Bostonian, the ninth generation of distinguished Puritan stock, who entered the Episcopalian ministry and pastored with great power in Philadelphia and in Boston. His sermons were topical rather than expositional, and he has been criticized for thinness of doctrine. Nonetheless he is considered one of America's greatest preachers. His delivery came in lightning bursts; he felt he had more to say than time in which to say it.

While at Philadelphia's Holy Trinity Church, Phillips, 30, visited the Holy Land. On December 24, 1865, traveling by horseback from Jerusalem, he attended a five-hour Christmas Eve service at the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem. He was deeply moved. "I remember standing in the old church in Bethlehem," he later said, "close to the spot where Jesus was born, when the whole church was ringing hour after hour with splendid hymns of praise to God, how again and again it seemed as if I could hear voices I knew well, telling each other of the *Wonderful Night* of the Savior's birth. "

Three years later, as he prepared for the Christmas season of 1867, he wanted to compose an original Christmas hymn for the children to sing during their annual program. Recalling his magical night in Bethlehem, he wrote a little hymn

of five stanzas and handed the words to his organist, Lewis Redner, saying, "Lewis, why not write a new tune for my poem. If it is a good tune, I will name it 'St. Lewis' after you."

Lewis struggled with his assignment, complaining of no inspiration. Finally, on the night before the Christmas program, he awoke with the music ringing in his soul. He jotted down the melody, then went back to sleep. The next day, a group of six Sunday school teachers and thirty-six children sang "O Little Town of Bethlehem."

Brooks was so pleased with the tune that he did indeed name it for his organist, changing the spelling to *St. Louis*, so as not to embarrass him. The fourth stanza, usually omitted from our hymnbooks, says:

Where children pure and happy pray to the blessed Child,
Where misery cries out to Thee, Son of the mother mild;
Where charity stands watching and faith holds wide the door,
The dark night wakes, the glory breaks, and Christmas comes once more.

The Story Behind the "12 Days of Christmas"

The song was written by Catholics in England as a catechism song to teach their children about the Christian Faith. The song's "gifts" help remember the teachings of the faith. "True Love" refers to God. "Me" refers to every Christian.

The other symbols mean the following:

- 1 Partridge in a Pear Tree—Jesus Christ.
- 2 Turtle Doves—the Old and New Testaments.
- 3 French Hens—Faith, hope, and Charity or the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, Trinity.
- 4 <u>Calling Birds</u>—The Four Gospels.
- 5 Golden Rings—First Five Books of the Old Testament.
- 6 Geese-A-Laying—The Six Days of Creation.
- 7 <u>Swans-A-Swimming</u>—The Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:8-10).
- 8 <u>Maids-A-Milking</u>—The Eight Beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-10).
- 9 <u>Ladies Dancing</u>—The Nine Fruits of the Holy Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23)
- 10 <u>Lords-A-Leaping</u>—The Ten Commandments.
- 11 Pipers Piping—The Eleven Faithful Apostles, (Not Judas).
- 12 <u>Drummers Drumming</u>—The Twelve Points of Doctrine or Belief in the Apostle's Creed.
