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You are the Light

One of the geniuses of Jesus' teaching was its simplicity. Jesus was able to express profound eternal truths through colorful metaphors and parables.

In Matthew 5:13-20, Jesus teaches... "You are the salt of the earth."

Salt is life. Salt is valuable. Salt adds flavor and joy to life. Let us share that salt.

Jesus continues,

"You are the light of the world."

A bold statement, especially to his group of disciples who might have felt they were the lowest on the ladder of the world order. Jesus knew different. Jesus could see such power and potential that these people could not yet even imagine. He could see the light.

Jesus calls us to be a light to those spiritually blind to the Truth. Blind to knowing that there is a God who loves them as they are, no strings attached. Blind and trapped in a world darkened by the fear of death. People who struggle to find purpose and direction in their lives. An analogy from my own experience:

When I was young and started deer hunting, I was the guy who was always getting lost. Especially in the mornings as I trekked my way before sunrise into the woods looking for my tree-stand. No matter how clear the directions I received seemed to be, I would end up wondering around in the dark, making enough noise to scare deer away for miles, and giving up only to sit down and wait until daybreak. Of course, I would look up and find that I was only ten feet away from the stand.

One evening, I was at one of the farthest stands away from Granny Dutton's house which served as our hunting lodge. Right at dust (what my dad always called the witching hour for increased deer movement), I thought I heard something coming my direction. The sound of a small twig breaking. Perhaps the crackle of dry leaves on the ground. The tension grew and my imagination went wild. I was sure a big ten-point monster buck would step into the clearing at any moment.

Then there was nothing. All went completely quiet.

So intense I was on the watch, I didn't realize that it was now completely dark, and the cold was quickly creeping in. In that part of Grayson Country Virginia, houses are miles apart. There are very few roads and even less traffic. The whole world settled in silence. The woods I hunt in are a series of rolling ridges and hollows. Most of the ridges are covered with dense thickets of mountain laurel. Virtually impassable.

I began to make my way back, but soon every direction looked the same. My little flashlight only provided enough light to keep me from falling over a log or heading into a run of heavy brush or thorns. Then I realized that I was not even sure if I was heading North, South, East, or

West. That is when the fear set in. I began to panic and started walking faster, like that was going to help. Finally, I had to stop to catch my breath.

I looked around again, then something caught my eye. Way up on the top of a ridge near the horizon, I saw the slight twinkle of a light. I focused, and the light grew clearer. It was then I realized, I knew exactly what I was looking at. Years before, Granny Dutton had arranged to put up a flood light on a telephone pole to light the area around her house. The light would shine from dusk to dawn.

That light was my guide home. It revealed to me where I was going, but also where I currently was. Carefully I stepped my way through the woods home.

It is hard to appreciate the wonder of light unless you experience the fear of darkness. It is also difficult to appreciate what it means to be a light to the world unless we are conscious of how many people around us are living in worlds darkened by sin, illness, abuse, addiction, loneliness, and the looming fear of death. Ernest Hemingway once wrote, paraphrasing a line from Shakespeare's play 'Julius Caesar', "a coward dies a thousand deaths." I would add that anyone who lives a life fearing death also dies a thousand deaths.

You are the light of the world. You don't have to do anything to be that light. It is already a part of you as Christ is a part of your being and your knowledge of the Truth. You are a reflection of the true light of Jesus Christ.

Don't hold back. Let that light shine. Let someone know that they have value and are loved. Point them in the direction to a place where that light shines in the proclamation of the good news of the of Christ Jesus, the observance of the sacraments, and the fellowship of believers. Jesus needs us. Don't let him down.

Music Notes





Jesus, Lover of My Soul 1740

Many stories have arisen around the writing of "Jesus, Lover of My Soul," but they all appear to be fictional. We don't know the exact occasion for his composition, but it was written shortly after Charles Wesley's conversion, and its words seem to anticipate the huge crowds, lawless mobs, midnight escapes, traveling dangers, and flea-infested beds he would encounter in coming years. Wesley's life, in brief, can be summed up as follows:

As the Methodist movement spread through England, Charles traveled horseback from place to place, an itinerant, homeless evangelist. His fiery preaching incited revival in some people and outrage in others.

In the midst of all this, his dear mother, Susanna, died on July 23, 1742. Her last words were, "Children, as soon as I am released, sing a psalm of praise to God." Later, preaching in Wales, Charles me Sally Gwynne, a beautiful girl half his age. A courtship followed, and Charles wanted to propose, but he was virtually penniless with no way of supporting a wife. That's when he decided to publish his Hymns and Sacred Poems, as well as his journals and sermons, hoping the royalties would provide an income. Charles and Sally were married on April 8, 1749, Charles noting: "Not a cloud was to be seen from morning till night. I rose at four, spent three hours and a half in prayer or signing with my brother.... At eight I led my Sally to church.... It was a most solemn season of love!"

They left immediately on a preaching tour, and Charles continued his itinerant ministry until

1756, when at age 49, exhausted, he and Sally settled down. Charles busied himself preaching, visiting, counseling, fretting about his three unsaved children, trying to keep Methodism within the Church of England, and giving unsolicited advice to his brother, John. All the while, he worked on his hymns and poems.

By early 1788, Charles was bedfast, not from sickness but from a lifetime of fatigue. By March, too weak to write, he dictated his last hymn to Sally:

In age and feebleness extreme, who shall a sinful worm redeem? Jesus, my only hope thou art, strength of my failing flesh and heart; Oh, could I catch a smile from Thee, and drop into eternity!

Chefs Corner

Baked Rigatoni Casserole

1lb. rigatoni pasta (cooked) 2lb. Italian sausage (bulk)

2Tbsp fresh garlic minced 1 tsp. oregano 1½ lb. shredded mozzarella Parmesan cheese

2 cans tomato paste 1tsp. basil 2 cans tomato sauce 2tbsp. sugar

4 cups water salt & pepper to taste

Brown sausage with garlic, salt, pepper. Add tomato paste,

tomato sauce, water, oregano, basil, and sugar. Simmer for 1½ hours. In a casserole dish (5quart) put a layer of sauce mix, a layer of rigatoni, a layer of mozzarella, sprinkle parmesan cheese. Repeat layers 2 more times. Cover and bake in oven at 300* for about 30-45 minutes.

Buster Bar Pie

1(15oz) pkg. Oreo 2 cups peanuts

1 stick butter ½ gallon vanilla ice cream

1 jar butterscotch-caramel sauce 1(8oz.) can Hershey's fudge sauce

1 (12oz.) cool whip

Crush Oreos and reserve ½ cup for topping pie. Melt butter, pour over Oreos and press into a 9x13-inch pan then bake at 350* for 3 minutes, let cool. Once cooled layer the ice cream on top. Put in freezer until hard. Spread fudge topping on ice cream and sprinkle with peanuts to cover. Drizzle butterscotch-caramel over nuts. Spread cool whip on top then sprinkle with reserved Oreos. Put I freezer for several hours or overnight. Before serving let stand at room temperature for 10 minutes or till able to slice with ease.

Taco Soup

1 lb. ground beef 1 pkg. taco seasoning

½ cup chopped onion 1(29oz.) can diced tomatoes

3 cups shredded cheddar cheese corn chips 2(16oz.) cans kidney beans sour cream

1(16oz.) can tomato sauce

Cook beef and onion until browned, drain off excess fat. Add taco seasoning, tomatoes and the juice, tomato sauce, and undrained kidney beans. Simmer for 20-30 minutes. Serve in a bowl topped with cheese, chips, and sour cream.
