Pastor's Message – He is Risen Indeed!

If you peruse the annuals of world history, you will find few people who became famous just because they died. Of course, all human beings will at some point in their existence eventually die and be buried in some form or fashion.

If you want to make the list of the famed, however, you need look to powerful kings or queens who built cities, great monuments, and won wars. Names like Pharaoh Ramses II of Egypt, Caesar Augustus the first Roman Emperor, the Mongolian conqueror Genghis Khan, Peter the Great of Russia, and Queen Elizabeth I of England all come to mind.

Fame has also been rewarded to several renown adventures like Robert Peary and Matthew Henson who braved some of the worst climates and dangers on earth to reach the north pole. David Livingstone, a Scottish physician, and missionary whose travels into the darkest places of Africa gained him almost mythical status.

Yet the most famous person in history conquered no empires, captured no great stores of wealth, or made no great journeys into the unknown places of the world. He died a shameful death reserved for slaves and traitors. Surely, this carpenter whose life left some interesting stories, nevertheless, would have been quickly forgotten by history but...

He did not stay dead!

Jesus did the one thing that no other human, not even the greatest warrior, wiseman, or ruler, could do. Jesus rose from death and is alive.

I have always been fascinated by the form of our Easter greeting. I am a language guy and I appreciate the subtly of words. If you were a strict grammarian, you may even be a bit annoyed that we Christians find this greeting acceptable: 'He is Risen'. The reason is that by combining the present tense 'is' with the perfect (past) tense 'risen' we have created a kind of theological paradox. It is like "he rose from the dead, is rising from the dead, continues to rise from the dead, and is alive', and we live in the reality of Easter that just keeps on happening. Death could not get a grip on Jesus, and that is the same for us. Life keeps happening. Easter is now and continues forever.

But that's not all. If Jesus had not been resurrected, would the world even know he existed? Perhaps Jesus would have been a side note in one of the volumes of history for the period written by someone like the renown Jewish historian Titus Flavius Josephus.

Jesus' resurrection may have made him known to the world, but as Christians studied the scriptures and thought and talked about what Jesus had said, they began to understand that it was Jesus' death on the cross which was the focal point of Jesus' life and indeed world history. In the resurrection we see the power of God. In Jesus death, we see the love of God. For God, power is

easy. But giving of his Son to die, that was hard. It was God's promise that no price was too much and no sacrifice too great.

Indeed, Jesus's death has made him famous. Once an instrument of torture and death, the cross became the symbol of love and life to all the world. Christ gave his life for us. Christ is Risen. He is Risen Indeed! So that we also may no more die.

Chefs Corner

Lemon Squares

1 cup butter
2 cup sugar
½ cup powdered sugar
½ cup flour
4 eggs
2 cup sugar
½ cup lemon juice
1 tsp. baking powder

Melt butter and mix with powdered sugar. Add 2 cups of flour, beating until blended. Spread evenly in bottom of a greased 9x13 inch pan. Bake at 350* for 20 minutes. In a small bowl beat eggs until

light and foamy. Gradually add sugar, beating till thick and blended. Add lemon juice, the remaining ½ cup flour and baking powder; beat until well blended. Pour mixture over baked crust and bake for 25 minutes. Remove from oven and sprinkle evenly with powdered sugar.

Overnight Breakfast Casserole

12 slices bread (cut in cubes) 8 eggs
2 cups shredded cheese 2 cup milk
½ cup melted butter 1 tsp. salt

3 cups cubed ham or 1 lb. cooked sausage

Grease a 9x13 inch baking dish. Put half of the bread cubes on the bottom. Top with half of the cheese and meat. Repeat with remaining bread, cheese, and meat. Combine eggs, milk, and salt. Pour over top of layers. Drizzle melted butter over top. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Bake at 350* for 1 hour or till done, uncover for the last 15 minutes.

Spicy Tomato Soup

2 Tbsp. oil 2 cup chicken broth 2 cups diced onion salt & pepper, to taste

2 cups diced celery 2 Tbsp. hot sauce or tobacco sauce

1½ qt. tomato juice 2 tsp. cayenne pepper

Crushed red pepper if desired

Heat oil in a 4 qt. soup pot and sauté the onion and celery till translucent. Add the rest of the ingredients and simmer for 45 minutes.

Tim's Homemade BBQ Sauce

3 cups ketchup 2 Tbsp. liquid smoke

2 tsp paprika 2 tsp. salt 3 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce ½ cup vinegar

2 Tbsp. mustard 2½ cup brown sugar

Combine all ingredients and cook on low till thick about 20-25 minutes

It Is Well with My Soul 1873

When the great Chicago fire consumed the Windy City in 1871, Horatio G. Spafford, an attorney heavily invested in real estate, lost a fortune. About that time, his only son, age 4, succumbed to scarlet fever. Horatio drowned his grief in work, pouring himself into rebuilding the city and assisting the 100,000 who had been left homeless.

In November of 1873, he decided to take his wife and daughters to Europe. Horatio was close to D. L. Moody and Ira Sankey, and he wanted to visit their evangelistic meetings in England, then enjoy a vacation.

When an urgent matter detained Horatio in New York, he decided to send his wife, Anna, and their four daughters, Maggie, Tanetta, Annie, and Bessie, on ahead. As he saw them settled into their cabin aboard the luxurious French liner *Ville du Havre*, an unease filled his mind, and he moved them to a room closer to the bow of the ship. Then he said good-bye, promising to join them soon.

During the small hours of November 22, 1873, as the *Villa du Havre*, glided over smooth seas, the passengers were jolted from their bunks. The ship had collided with an iron sailing vessel, and water poured in like Niagara. The *Villa du Havre* tilted dangerously. Screams, prayers, and

oaths merged into a nightmare of unmeasured terror. Passengers clung to posts, tumbled through darkness, and were swept away by powerful currents of icy ocean. Loved ones fell from each other's grasp and disappeared into foaming blackness. Within two hours, the mighty ship vanished beneath the waters. The 226 fatalities included Maggie, Tanetta, Annie, and Bessie. Mrs. Spafford was found nearly unconscious, clinging to a piece of the wreckage. When the 47 survivors landed in Cardiff, Wales, she cabled her husband: "Saved Alone."

Horatio immediately booked passage to join his wife. En route, on a cold December night, the captain called him aside and said, "I believe we are now passing over the place where the *Villa du Havre* went down." Spafford went to his cabin but found it hard to sleep. He said to himself, "It is well; the will of God be done." He later wrote his famous hymn based on those words.


