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When Jesus Comes Again

Gregory L. Fisher in Leadership magazine tells of teaching a class at the West African Bible College. One day the class was discussing the Second Coming of Christ. A student asked Fisher a question that took him by surprise. The question was this: "What will he say when he shouts?"

The student said, "Reverend, 1 Thessalonians 4:16 says that Christ will descend from heaven with a loud command. I would like to know what that command will be." Fisher wanted to leave the question unanswered, to tell the student that they must not go past what Scripture has revealed, but his mind wandered to an encounter he had earlier in the day with a refugee from the Liberian civil war.

The man, a high school principal, told him how he was apprehended by a two-man death squad. After several hours of terror, as the men described how they would torture and kill him, he narrowly escaped. After hiding in the bush for two days, he was able to find his family and escape to a neighboring country. The escape cost him dearly: two of his children lost their lives. The stark cruelty unleashed on an unsuspecting, undeserving population had touched Fisher deeply.

He also saw flashbacks of the beggars that he passed each morning on his way to the office. Every day he saw how poverty destroys dignity, robs people of the best of what it means to be human, and sometimes substitutes the worst of what it means to be an animal. Fisher says even now he is haunted by the vacant eyes of people who have lost all hope.

"Reverend, you have not given me an answer," the student demanded. "What will Christ say?"

The question hadn't gone away. "Enough," Fisher said in answer to the question. "He will shout, Enough! when he returns."

A look of surprise opened the face of the student. "What do you mean, enough?" And Fisher said firmly, "Enough suffering. Enough starvation. Enough terror. Enough death. Enough indignity. Enough lives trapped in hopelessness. Enough sickness and disease. Enough time. ENOUGH!" (https://www.sermons.com/sermon/the-good-news-about-the-future/1439632, author King Duncan)

When we see the pain and suffering happening in the world every day, it is natural to wonder why God doesn't do something about it. We live in a broken world. The evil and cruelty of humanity seems to have no limits.

But this is not the world God created it to be. In the beginning, it was good, very good. Christ came to begin the process of healing humanity from the brokenness of sin and restore our

relationship with God. Jesus also promises to return and make all things right. Sin, death, and evil will be forever purged. In Revelation, John witnesses the coming of new heaven and new earth. The goodness God intended for his children, will become a reality. When enough time has passed according to God's plan, God will make it so.

This may be a strange message for the Christmas season. Yet we must not forget that when the child Jesus was born, he was born into a cruel world, and eventually Jesus would be a victim of that cruelty. Nevertheless, God always has the last word. Appended to the words of the angels, "I am bringing you good news of great joy" would be the Easter proclamation, "He is Risen." We cannot have Christmas without Easter nor Easter with Christmas.

I hope you and your family have a joyful and meaningful Christmas.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ANNUAL CHRISTMAS PROGRAM

The annual Sunday School Christmas Program will be held **Sunday**, **December 22**nd during the worship service, starting **at 10:15 a.m.** Please join us in worship and hear our young talented youth sing and have fun with various skits concerning the joyous holiday season and the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ. Fellowship Committee will have cookies and drinks after the Service in the Fellowship Hall. Please bring your favorite cookies to share during fellowship time.

Chefs Copper

Cream Cheese Cranberry Loaf

2 cups flour 2 cups cranberries 1½ cups sugar 2 sticks of butter 8 oz. cream cheese 4 eggs

1½ tsp. vanilla 1½ tsp. baking soda

½ tsp. salt

Preheat your oven to 350*. Lightly grease two 9x5-inch loaf pans with butter or non-stick spray. In a large bowl or mixer, cream together the butter, cream cheese, and sugar until smooth and fluffy. Add eggs one at a

time, beating well after each addition, then mix in the vanilla extract. In a separate bowl, whisk together the flour, baking soda, and salt until well combined. Gradually add the dry ingredients to the wet ingredients, mixing just until incorporated. Gently fold in the cranberries, being careful not to overmix. Divide the batter evenly between the prepared loaf pans. Place in the oven and bake for 60-70 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center of each loaf comes out clean. Remove from the oven and let the loaves cool in the pans for at least 15 minutes before slicing and serving.

Potato and Bacon Soup

4 large potatoes, peeled and diced
6 slices of bacon, chopped
1 cup onion, diced
3 cloves garlic, minced
4 cups chicken or vegetable broth
1 cup heavy cream

Salt and pepper to taste

Shredded cheddar cheese, for serving

In a large pot or Dutch oven, cook the chopped bacon over medium heat until crispy. Remove the bacon and set aside on a paper towel to drain, leaving about 2 tablespoons of drippings in the pot. In the same pot, add the diced onion and cook until softened, about 5 minutes. Add the minced garlic and cook for another minute until fragrant. Add the diced potatoes & broth to the pot. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat and let it simmer until the potatoes are tender, about 15-20 minutes. Using an immersion blender, blend the soup until smooth. Alternatively, transfer half of the soup to a blender and blend until smooth, then return it to the pot. For a chunkier texture, blend only a portion. Stir in the heavy cream and season with salt and pepper to taste. Let the soup heat through for another 5 minutes. Ladle the soup into bowls and top with the crispy bacon and shredded cheddar cheese.

White Hot Chocolate

2 cup milk 1 cup white chocolate chips ½ cup heavy cream Whipped cream, for topping

Crushed candy canes (optional) Marshmallows

In a saucepan, warm the milk over medium heat until it's hot but not boiling. Add the white chocolate chips to the hot milk. Stir continuously until the chocolate is completely melted and the mixture is smooth. In a separate bowl, whisk the heavy cream until it forms soft peaks. Gently fold the whipped cream into the white chocolate mixture, blending until well combined. Pour the hot chocolate into mugs. Top each mug with whipped cream, extra white chocolate chips, marshmallows, and crushed candy canes, if desired.

(I must confess I had my eye on the staff- thinking we could turn our next talent show into the Gong Show or hook Pastor Lindsey if his sermon goes too long).



Music Notes & Films





Good King Wenceslas 1854

This story is about two men—a bohemian Duke and an Anglican minister—who lived nearly a thousand years apart.

Wenceslas was born in Bohemia, in modern Czechoslovakia, in the early 900's. His father, the Czech ruler, Duke Ratislav, gave him a good education supervised by his godly grandmother. When his father died, Wenceslas, seeing his mother mishandle affairs of the state, stepped in at the age of 18, seizing the reins of government. From the beginning, he proved a different sort of king. He sought good relations with the surrounding nations, particularly with Germany. He took steps to reform the judicial system, reducing the number of death sentences and the arbitrary power of judges. He encouraged the building of churches and showed heartfelt concern for the poor. He reportedly cut firewood for orphans and widows, often carrying the provisions on his own shoulders through the snow.

Wenceslas' brief reign ended suddenly. His pagan and rebellious brother, Boleslav, murdered him on September 28, 929, as he left for church. His people venerated him as a martyr, and today Wenceslas is the patron saint of Czechoslovakia.

He would be hardly remembered, however, but for John Mason Neale, an Anglican minister with a passion for returning church architecture

and music to their ancient grandeur. Neale helped establish a committee to investigate and restore dilapidated church buildings in Great Britain. He was particularly upset at the ugly stoves installed to heat churches in Victorian times.

Disliking the hymns of Issac Watts, he sought to return church music to its medieval roots. Neale worked hard to translate ancient Greek, Latin, and Syrian hymns to English. In doing so, he gave us the Christmas carols, "Good Christian Men Rejoice," (a fourteenth-century text set to a fourteenth-century tune), and "O Come, O Come Emmanuel," (a ninth-century text set to a fifteenth-century tune). He also translated the Palm Sunday hymn "All Glory, Laud, and Honor."

Good King Wenceslas is not a translation, but an original poem written by Neale to honor a godly monarch's concern for the poor. Neale himself worked with the needy, serving as warden of a charitable residence for indigent old men.

John Neale's antiquated opinions were widely scorned in his own day, but we're still singing his songs.

The Story Behind the "12 Days of Christmas"

The song was written by Catholics in England as a catechism song to teach their children about the Christian Faith. The song's "gifts" help remember the teachings of the faith. "True Love" refers to God. "Me" refers to every Christian.

The other symbols mean the following:

- 1 Partridge in a Pear Tree—Jesus Christ.
- 2 Turtle Doves—the Old and New Testaments.
- 3 French Hens—Faith, hope, and Charity or the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, Trinity.
- 4 <u>Calling Birds</u>—The Four Gospels.
- 5 Golden Rings—First Five Books of the Old Testament.
- 6 Geese-A-Laying—The Six Days of Creation.
- 7 <u>Swans-A-Swimming</u>—The Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:8-10).
- 8 <u>Maids-A-Milking</u>—The Eight Beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-10).
- 9 <u>Ladies Dancing</u>—The Nine Fruits of the Holy Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23)
- 10 <u>Lords-A-Leaping</u>—The Ten Commandments.
- 11 Pipers Piping—The Eleven Faithful Apostles, (Not Judas).
- 12 <u>Drummers Drumming</u>—The Twelve Points of Doctrine or Belief in the Apostle's Creed.
